
The 2015 Annual Meeting's time was shifted by three hours this year to accommodate shareholders who were working at Icy Strait Point but wished to attend the meeting after the calling ship left port. The time shift allowed the Board Members and the management team to see the ISP team in action on a ship call day. The ISP team operated as a well-oiled machine and represented all the Xúna Kaawu well to the cruise ship guests.

Overcoming Obstacles Together with Hoonah Tunnel Project

History

In December, R&M Engineering presented its findings to the Hoonah City Council, identifying two project goals: i) mitigate/eliminate falling rock along the Cannery Road rock cut slope; and, ii) improve public safety to motorists and pedestrians. R&M's recommended approach from the six mitigation options evaluated was; excavation, removal and benching of the rock and hillside. This approach was identified as a permanent, long-term solution with minimal long-term maintenance, and a lower cost than the other permanent solutions considered. The preliminary recommended plan called for a two-phase project creating six 14-foot benches which would remove loose rock, increase the distance between the road and hillside, and let each bench serve to catch any subsequent minor rock knocked loose by weather or other natural causes. Public safety and access was a priority with one lane of traffic to be maintained during all non-blasting times controlled by flaggers.

The City of Hoonah and Hoonah Indian Association approached land owners Huna Totem Corporation and Sealaska, requesting permission to complete this public safety project. After extensive debate of the cultural significance of the area and public safety concern, the Huna Totem Board in January authorized limited access to HTC land by the City and its contractor on the project, HIA, in order to complete this project including site restoration to reduce any visual impact from this work by May 1, ahead of the tourist season. HTC agreed to waive the usual access fee charged to commercial users for removal of material from HTC land. HTC was pleased to be able to work in partnership with the City and HIA on this important project.

Delays & Working Together

As the project ran into some bumps and the road closures increased, the City was very accommodating, providing financial assistance with ISP's direct costs, such as boat transportation for the ISP staff.

As the initial ship call of the season approached, the decision was made to halt new work toward completion of the project and focus on creating a safe, navigable roadway for vehicles and pedestrians. Gunalchéesh to the entire team for the final push to get this road open so that ISP and all Hoonah operators were able to pick up the first visitors of 2015, take them on tours, and bring them downtown to experience Hoonah hospitality.

Interim Access & Completion

The temporary road is safe and usable by vehicles and pedestrians. While in place, it will be maintained by the City of Hoonah, just as they do the permanent road.

HTC is currently finalizing the schedule for upland construction on the new dock and ISP expansion. It's anticipated that there will be a short window immediately following the final ship of the 2015 season when temporary road access will be required for the delivery of materials and crew. Once this is complete, HIA should be able to resume the drilling, blasting, and removal of excess rock required for the permanent reopening of the road, well ahead of 2016 startup activities next spring. Financial Stewardship

I was reviewing a bit of our history in preparation for last month's Shareholder's Information Fair. I frequently find myself caught up in the immediate demands on my attention and it's easy to lose perspective of the big picture. I was so struck by how far we've come since 1971; I just had to share this for those of you who weren't able to join us in Hoonah.

The Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA) was signed into law on December 18, 1971. At the time, this return to Alaska Natives of 44 million acres of land and payment of \$962.5 million in cash represented the largest settlement of indigenous land claims in the country's history. This long fought, hard won settlement represented a victory not just for Alaskan Natives, but all indigenous peoples. This legislation paved the way for the creation of 12 Regional Corporations and over 200 Village Corporations, including Huna Totem Corporation which was established on November 9, 1973.

Huna Totem's award under ANCSA was 23,040 acres of land and \$5,344,412 in cash. On July 31, 2013, Huna Totem Corporation received our final land patent, bringing the total land returned to HTC under ANCSA to 23,043 acres. All of which HTC still owns and controls, consistent with the first Guiding Principle of the HTC Vision, "Maintain our land in perpetuity."

How have we done looking after the \$5.3 million in cash? Our land?

Between 1981, the year HTC paid its first corporate dividend, and now, your corporation has made \$74.9 million in cash distributions to shareholders and contributions to Huna Heritage Foundation to fund educational scholarships and cultural activities. HTC has contributed to HHF every year since 1990.

Since 1986, cash distributions have been made every year, for 28 years in the form of corporate dividends, and/or trust distributions from the Shareholders Settlement Trust (SST) and Elders Benefit Trust (EBT).

After all these cash payments to shareholders, the book value of HTC at 2014 year end was \$28 million and the value of the SST was \$36.4 million.

This represents a return of 26 times on the original \$5.3 million ANCSA cash proceeds awarded, and we still have all 23,043 acres of our land, a profitable corporation that employs over 100 shareholders and descendants, and the SST, which is a source of both current distributions and growth from the 40% of reinvested income. Our prudent stewardship of both the land and funds received by HTC under ANCSA has ensured the continued success of our corporation.

Hoonah Cruise Ship Dock Construction Underway



The pier design is 100% complete! Materials arrived via barge May 28th. Duck Point Development Project Manager, Mark Keller, attended the HTC Shareholder Information Meeting/Fair to share project designs, schematics, solicit Marine Mammal Observer (MMO) applications and answer questions. As a result, Duck Point Development trained and hired many Hoonah locals as MMOs. HTC purchased rock from the City of Hoonah generated by the tunnel bluffs safety project for the cruise ship pier construction and uplands work, which also benefitted the City financially. Due to a delay in the Core of Engineers permit, the construction schedule is being re-sequenced but project completion is still scheduled for September, before the end of the 2015 season. The design and pre-construction cost estimates of the upland civil infrastructure to support the pier is being finalized.

A new transportation center for ISP excursions will be added, which will include a Hoonah operator pick-up and drop-off location, in addition to a City of Hoonah Informational Kiosk.

Icy Strait Point Looking to 2017 Cruise Season

While the 2015 Alaska cruise season is in full swing in Alaska, Icy Strait Point (ISP) and Huna Totem Corporation staff have already been busy promoting the destination for inclusion in 2017 cruise itineraries. Efforts began with the March Cruise Shipping Miami trade show, where more than 970 companies and destinations exhibit, with the intent of attracting the attention of the cruise line industry. Participating as part of the State of Alaska Pavilion, ISP was promoted for its authentic Alaskan experience, Native Tlingit culture, and profitability. Most important, the booth allowed ISP staff to meet with dozens of cruise line staff interested in learning more about the destination and the key features that differentiate ISP from other destinations. Of particular interest this year, many visitors wanted updates regarding the construction of ISP's new pier and floating dock, which was widely regarded with anticipation and excitement.

As important as the Miami event is for making and reinforcing contacts, it is such a busy event that it can be difficult to have in-depth discussions with key decision-makers from ISP's established and most promising business partners. In order to make sure ISP is properly considered by those key decision-makers, as well as to learn more about the mindset of each company, ISP and HTC staff met with individuals from Princess Cruises, Holland America Cruise Line, Norwegian Cruise Line, and Royal Caribbean International, and Carnival Cruises in April and May.

In addition to providing the opportunity to promote the destination, these visits also provide our partners the chance to provide us with candid feedback about our product, update us on emerging trends in the industry, and indicate opportunities that ISP might pursue to make it the most compelling Alaska destination. Based on the feedback received from these visits, the most significant addition that ISP could make is the construction of the new pier; this major improvement will make ISP much more marketable as a destination by enhancing the visitor experience and increasing disembarkation percentages thanks to eliminating the need to tender guests. In a positive sign, many key cruise line executives and senior personnel have or will visit Icy Strait Point during 2015 to see the site in person.

Apart from trade calls, the ISP team has been busy working with journalists from around the country to ensure that ISP is featured in articles in major travel publications. We have already hosted one journalist visit this summer and have several more scheduled throughout the season.

Neighbor's Days in Hoonah Provide Fun Escape for Juneau Guests

Icy Strait Point (ISP) hosted two Neighbor's Day events, one on May 23rd and the second on June 6th. Juneau guests were eager to experience the charm and excitement of ISP. The guests zipped down the mountain, tasted the new delicious menu at ISP, and explored Hoonah. The events were hosted while other cruise ships were in port, so shore excursions were open and available for purchase by Neighbors' Day patrons. The next Neighbor's Day events are scheduled for July 4th and August 29th.

As a part of August 29th Neighbor's Day, Icy Strait Point will be hosting J'eet's Challenge. This 8.5 mile race from ISP to the top of the ZipRider is a 1,550 ft. climb. All runners will ZipRide back to ISP in the order that they arrive at the finish line. For those that want a more relaxed challenge, there is a 5k fun run/walk. This event is in honor of J'eet's tremendous efforts to protect Hoonah from hostiles by warning the villagers who were away from camp of the impending threat to the community. The top four finishers will each light signal fires at the top of the mountain; much like J'eet did to signal the danger. Alaska Native Voices Educational Institute Offers Extended Trainings



Alaska Native Voices Educational Institute (ANVEI) concluded their spring staff training with a variety of activities. Cultural Heritage Guides attended a Tlingit Language class during winter semester. As they reflected back upon their 16-week semester together, the students shared a common outlook: a sense of accomplishment, a need to become more proficient in the Tlingit language, an improved confidence in their individual communication skills, and appreciation for the team-building that took place throughout the class.

The pre-season internal training was also accompanied by a joint-training with the National Park Service. This partnership continues to increase the cohesiveness between the natural and cultural interpretive teams working in Glacier Bay. ANVEI also explored other opportunities for training with existing partners in the industry and as a result, Gene Tagaban, a professional storyteller, trainer, speaker and mentor from the T'akdeintaan clan, provided a Storytelling and Presentation Skills Workshop in Hoonah at Icy Strait Point (ISP) for attendees from ANVEI, ISP, and Alaskan Dream Cruises (ADC). ANVEI's Visitor Programs Manager, Mario Fulmer, said "The three days of training for over thirty people was an amazing addition to this year's training. We were all given a gift that can be utilized not only for work, but in our own lives."

Mario aspires to host more of these types of trainings in collaboration with partners. He also extended a big thank you to Johanna Dybdahl, ISP's Cultural Supervisor, and the entire ISP team for helping to coordinate, facilitate, and contribute to such a successful workshop. During this time, Gene also offered his time and services to the

community of Hoonah with an evening of a storytelling where children, adults, individuals, and families could come out and join in a night of entertainment and fun. ANVEI also sends a special thank you to Gene Tagaban for his generosity, to Hoonah City School's Librarian, Amelia Wilson for facilitating, promoting, and welcoming Gene, and to the Hoonah City Schools for hosting the event at the Alumni Gym.

Shortly following the workshop, several members of the ANVEI team were invited to participate in a joint-training with ADC. This was a way to cross-train team members to work as a Cultural Expedition Leader aboard the ADC vessels and was the first step in an on-going resource sharing effort, which will create more work opportunities for guides, diversifying their skills, broadening their experiences, and creating stronger relationships between organizations. "We help and support ourselves by helping and supporting each other" says Mario Fulmer about the implements and his ambitions to support the growing relationships and opportunities.

Glacier Bay cultural interpretive programs, formerly provided by Alaska Native Voices, will now be provided by Alaska Native Voices Educational Institute ANVEI, a 501(c)3 non-profit organization. This non-profit will see greater opportunities to partner with other organizations and to grow professionally and culturally with a focus on providing cultural education provided by Native Guides for visitors to Glacier Bay National Park, the ancestral homeland of the Huna Tlingit. ANVEI has solid potential and aims to achieve great success now and well into the future.

What a Start to the 2015 Tour Season!

So far this year, ISP has been faced with many challenges and we have been able to overcome all of them. Having a closed road for almost three weeks right before the season starts does not seem like a big deal, however, when 60+ pre-season employees plus nearly 100 pallets of retail, food & beverage and facilities materials all have to be transported by boat it really throws a wrench into the gears. "I am proud of how well our staff got focused and met the challenge head on" said Tyler Hickman, Vice President of Operations.

ISP's pre-season training had a drastic change over previous years. Thanks to Gene Tagaban for joining and showing ISP's guides how to engage with guests in fun and entertaining ways, and to Brent Nixon for his scientific focus on the natural history world. Additional appreciation to both for their incredibly strong storytelling lessons. Earlier this year, ISP staff decided to stop referring to their guides as guides but rather as storytellers. Storytelling is a strong cultural tradition and we hope to have more locals and elders come down and join our storytelling team!

We are welcoming back existing retail stores such as Brenners, Alaska Wood Creations, Lisa's Art Store and Hi Bear Nation! We are also very excited to welcome Fishbone Gifts as well as the Jewel Box and Alaska Rope Gifts. Over and over we hear from our guests how much they enjoy the shops and appreciate buying from Alaskan and local vendors.

The site continues to improve each year. The new boardwalk and Cookhouse deck is complete and we look forward to being able to seat over 200 guests at the Cookhouse. Food and Beverage is off to its best start ever and are crushing sales goal — great food and great weather is the perfect formula for success. Thanks to the Icy Strait Point team for their exceptional efforts in getting the season going and to the HTC team for their stellar support. We look forward to seeing everyone at Icy Strait Point this summer!

Seasonal Housing for Icy Strait Point Employees

In addition to the Bunkhouse, which provided temporary housing for ISP employees last season, ISP is now offering an additional seven beds through converted conex trailers. This addition creates a total of twenty-one beds for ISP employees. The housing units will also house seventeen dock construction workers and later this fall will also house construction workers from the upland improvement projects at ISP. When the dock and uplands construction is done, all of the housing units will be available for ISP employee housing; approximately thirty-eight beds will be available for the 2016 operating season. Given the increased demand for housing in Hoonah, it has been a challenge to find seasonal housing for ISP's operating needs. Gunalchéesh to the ISP maintenance staff for all their hard work in installing the new housing units in a timely manner.

Alaska Native Voices Employee Awarded ATIA Scholarship
